# Vicar's Message

1 Kings 19:12

After the earthquake came a fire, but the LORD was not in the fire. And after the fire came a gentle whisper.



I wonder if you have ever given any serious consideration to the noise around us. Where it comes from and how it affects us all? The Oxford English Dictionary defines noise as..."sound or sounds especially when it is unwanted unpleasant or loud." Unfortunately, noise is almost always associated with the negative, loud noises mostly that can audibly be heard.

But noises also come in other forms too, which don't have to be audible. The media can cause noise in many ways, ways that fill our heads with distractions and worry. Social media seems to be the basis of noise in the form of socially accepted image and in turn this causes stress as we see those with "the perfect life" or those organisations which portray that they have it all right. Truth be told, neither of these examples "have it right".

Then there is the noise that the world around us gives in the form of financial pressures, rising utilities and the ever-increasing costs of food. Again, not audible noise but rather noise that is unwanted and does cause us discomfort, stress and distraction.

As you know we are in Lent, and one of the key markers I am trying to get across to you is the need to escape the worldly noise and retreat often into places of silence and if possible, solitude. Silence and solitude are keys for the Christian walk in the wilderness around us. Without silence we simply cannot hear God's word to us unless you are very proficient in blocking out that noise that is. Unfortunately, very few people can exist in the noise around them day in and day out and still maintain that spiritual awareness of Gods peace. It is a journey and a commitment, and one that the desert fathers, mothers and saints knew only too well.

St Benedict of Nursia (image above) is widely considered the Father of western monasticism, and he made it the very foundation block of his rule for Monks which you can find in the Rule of St Benedict's prologue where he says, "Listen my child to the words of the master and tend to them with the ear of your heart." Notice the key words here...**LISTEN, TEND, EAR** of the **HEART**. In other words, it is only through deep listening can we hear God, and it is not the physical ears that cause us to hear, rather the ear of the heart, it is a depth of listening that penetrates the soul and once penetrated we must then tend to what it is God is telling us. Furthermore, the fact this is in the very prologue on the very first line says how important listening and silence is to monastics in order to be able to live a life as close to God as possible.

So how can we foster this silence deeper? Well step one is of course sidelining a set time in your diary for silence. Not weekly, not monthly, not every so often when the vicar says to *be still* but daily. Start off by spending **15 minutes** in complete silence then work in further time as your practice goes on. Also, meditation can be immensely beneficial and is suitable for all Christians. Contrary to belief within certain Christian groups, meditation will not call-in demons, will not cause you to become a follower of Hinduism or any other nonsense, meditation at its basic is simply quieting the mind completely whilst maybe having a candle lit in front of you and a verse from scripture. You may wish to join our new sacred space meditation group beginning on the **3<sup>rd</sup> of March** in the hall?

We live in a world of ever-increasing noise; noise naturally affects us in such a way that it fills our minds and hearts with distractions and discomfort. This Lent, try and cultivate silence in you daily habit and see how this causes you to grow closer to the Lord.

# 30 years since the ordination of women

It was 30 years ago this month, on 12<sup>th</sup> March 1994, that the first 32 women were ordained as priests in the Church of England. The service was officiated by Bishop Barry Rogerson at Bristol Cathedral. Bishop Rogerson ordained the women in alphabetical order, so Angela Berners-Wilson was the very first woman to be ordained. She was a university chaplain. The youngest woman to be ordained that day was aged 30. The oldest was 69. By 2004, ten years on, one of the women priests had died, and 14 had retired. Bishop Rogerson reckoned it would take 10 years before the first woman would be ordained as a bishop. In the end, it took 21 years. Then Libby Lane was ordained the first female bishop in the Church of England. She became Bishop of Stockport, a suffragan bishop in the Diocese of Chester. The first woman to be ordained a diocesan bishop was the Rt Revd Rachel Treweek, Bishop of Gloucester, appointed on 26 March 2015. There are currently 25 women bishops in the Church of England.

### What's the Big Idea? -An Introduction to the Books of the Old Testament: Leviticus & Numbers

These books are concerned with Israel's wandering in the desert, on their journey from slavery in Egypt to the promised land of Canaan. Leviticus focuses on the regulations about worship, ceremonial cleanness, moral laws and holy days. The key theme is that of *holiness*, as every detail of our lives is affected by the presence of a holy God. The aim of the sacrifices, feast and Sabbaths was to enable the people to enter God's presence. We should see the instructions and practices in Leviticus as pointing to Jesus. He totally fulfilled the law through the sacrifice of His life, as Easter reminds us. He demonstrated the love and holiness of God, so that we can share His life: 'Be holy, because I am holy' (1 Peter 1:16, cf Lev 11:44-45; 19:2; 20:7). The book of Numbers tells the story of Israel's journey through the wilderness. The people were coming to terms with their *identity* as God's people and the *call* to serve Him. They didn't always respond with faith, gratitude and obedience, but with unbelief, ingratitude and rebellion. As a result of their refusal to enter Canaan (ch 14), they were condemned to spend the rest of their lives in the desert. However, God in His grace allowed their children to enter the Promised Land. The book reminds us that the Church is called to be a community that honours God, learns how to deal with sin in ourselves and others, and lives out love and justice in daily life.

'The LORD bless you and keep you; the LORD make his face shine upon you and be gracious to you; the LORD turn his face toward you and give you peace. (Numbers 6:24-26).

# Thanking two kinds of Mother on 10<sup>th</sup> March

Mothering Sunday, the fourth Sunday in Lent, is the day for honouring our Mother Church, and has been celebrated since the Middle Ages. Mother's Day is an annual day to honour our mothers, and it began in America in May 1907. In the US, Canada, Australia and Mexico, Mother's Day is still held in May. In Britain, Mothers' Day is held on Mothering Sunday, so the two days are often merged in people's minds. If you ask Google for ideas of how to be nice to your church on that day, you won't find much. But if you want to be kind to your mother that day,



you will be spoilt for choice. High on all the lists are suggestions for taking her to lunch, giving flowers, a card, or paying for her to have a day doing something she loves. Whatever you choose to do, probably the best thing to give your mother must surely be yourself: some time and some love. Remind her of the funny and touching stories of your childhood and thank her for all the things that she did for you. Give her some good company and show her some gratitude. Let her know that you love her and appreciate her.

Remember that the Commandment 'Honour thy father and mother' was the first commandment that came with a promise of blessing on you, if you obey.

# The story behind the hymn: 'Christ Arose!'

This Easter marks the 150<sup>th</sup> birthday of this much-loved hymn, sung each year by millions of Christians worldwide. It all began on a little pump organ in the living room of a college professor in Pennsylvania, back in 1874. Robert Lowry was professor of literature at Bucknell University, and pastor of a nearby church. He had a passion for poetry and music, and explained his 'muse' this way: "I watch my moods and when anything strikes me, whether words or music, no matter where I am, at home, on the street, I jot it down. My brain is a sort of spinning machine, for there is music running through it all the time. Sometimes the words come, and the music follows." Easter 1874 was approaching, and on this particular day Robert Lowry had been meditating on the gospel narratives of the Passion and Resurrection. The angel's words at the empty tomb, 'He is not here, but is risen' kept running through his mind. There was something there... Lowry moved to the little pump organ in his living room and gave himself up to the moment. Soon the words and the music for this joyous Easter hymn just fell into place.


Low in the grave He lay Jesus my Saviour! Waiting the coming day, Jesus my Lord!

crucified at 9 a.m. in the morning, and died six hours later, at 3pm. It is the most solemn day in the Christian year, and is widely marked by the removal of all decorations from churches. In Lutheran churches, the day was marked by the reading of the passion narrative in a gospel, a practice which lies behind the 'passions' composed by



Johann Sebastian Bach (1685 – 1750). Both the St Matthew Passion and the St John Passion have their origins in this observance of Good Friday. The custom of observing a period of three hours' devotion from 12 midday to 3 pm on Good Friday goes back to the 18th century. The 'Three Hours' of the Cross' often take the form of an extended meditation on the 'Seven Last Words from the Cross', with periods of silence, prayer, or hymn-singing.




